> NSW STATE ARCHIVES AND RECORDS NEWS

State Records are pleased to announce that they have a new name! On 25th October 2016, a change to the State Records Act 1998 (the Act) was approved returning 'Archives' to their name. The corporate name is now 'State Archives and Records Authority of New South Wales' but may also be called State Archives, State Archives NSW or State Archives and Records NSW. State Records is also pleased to announce a new program of webinars! For those of you not familiar with webinars, they are essentially an online presentation which you can enjoy live or as a recorded session streamed to your computer or mobile device. The webinar program is *free* and uses *GoToWebinar* to deliver the presentations. Each session will focus on the wonderful resources of the State archives collection. State Records will be presenting sessions live but will also be recording those sessions and loading those on to the website. This means if you are unable to attend live, you will be able to listen to the presentations at any time! Joining and participating in a live webinar is easy. TALK: CROWN STREET WOMEN'S HOSPITAL 1893-1983

Crown Street Women's Hospital, in the heart of Surry Hills, was the largest women's hospital in NSW. A referral hospital for women and an obstetric teaching centre, it also cared for Sydney's poorest and most marginalised women. The announcement of Crown Street's closure resulted in public uproar and street demonstrations. This comprehensive history reflects Sydney's rich past, and reveals Crown Street's 90 years impact on obstetric care. *Judith Godden* is a freelance historian specialising in the history of healthcare. She is a former academic at the University of Sydney and an Honorary Associate in its Department of History.

TALK: A VERY RUDE AWAKENING - SYDNEY'S BRUSH WITH INVASION

This year will mark the 75th anniversary of the Japanese midget submarine raid on Sydney. Three midget submarines crept into Sydney Harbour on 31 May 1942, determined to sink the American cruiser USS Chicago. However, they didn't get very far. This is a true but farcical story of what happened to the submarines, and worse, how we – the Australians and Americans – handled the situation. This is the most amazing narrative of our closest brush with invasion. This talk is presented by Peter Grose, who is a former journalist, literary agent and publisher and has written several acclaimed books.

She has won national and state awards for the Women Transported touring exhibition and accompanying publications which presented the largely untold story of Australia's convict female factories.

Australian Family Tree December /January 1917

Pages 22-24 Most Successful Bigamist on Record.

This story first appeared in Australian Town and Country Journal 23 September 1899 and is an amazing story. In the latter part of the seventeenth century a young surgeon named William Morrell became involved in money difficulties and began life as a professional bigamist. He chose women with money whom he left after defrauding them leaving them penniless. He was eventually found out and was indicted for marrying 6 wives; he pleaded guilty and admitted marrying 12 others! He was jailed and after serving time he found a home with a local baker. He claimed he was William Wickham from a wealthy family in Oxfordshire. He became ill when he was 60 and wrote a will with a bequest to the baker amounting to two thousand

pounds. The baker wrote to the Wickham family informing them of the death of their kinsman and discovered that William Morrell was once more breaking the law, he was not William Wickham. He was buried as a pauper in a corner of the local church.
